DAVID NIMMER, Visiting Professor at UCLA Law School and Of Counsel to Irell & Manella LLP in Los Angeles, California, is also a distinguished scholar at the Berkeley Center for Law and Technology. Since 1985, he has updated and revised *Nimmer on Copyright*, the standard reference treatise in the field, which was first published in 1963 by his late father, Professor Melville B. Nimmer. In addition to contributing to other treatises, David Nimmer has authored numerous law review articles on domestic and international copyright issues.



Nimmer on Copyright is routinely cited by U.S. and foreign courts at all levels in copyright litigation, and the courts have relied on many of his law review articles. In 1999, the Eleventh Circuit evaluated the constitutionality of GATT-inspired amendments to the Copyright Act by relying on “The End of Copyright,” 48 VAND. L. REV. 1385 (1995). In 1992, the Second Circuit adopted wholesale the test for copyright infringement of computer software proposed in “A Structured Approach to Analyzing the Substantial Similarity of Computer Software in Copyright Infringement Cases,” 20 ARIZ. ST. L.J. 625 (1988).

Professor Nimmer, a member of the American Law Institute, lectures widely in the copyright arena. Besides in-house seminars for the legal staffs of Turner Broadcasting in Atlanta and Times Mirror in New York and Los Angeles, he has lectured nationally and internationally at bar associations, MILIA in Cannes, ALAI in Tel Aviv, LUISS in Rome, IMPRIMATUR in London, and the Copyright Society of Japan in Tokyo.

In addition to writing and lecturing, Professor Nimmer represents clients in the entertainment, publishing, and high-technology fields. He gave congressional testimony on behalf of the United States Telephone Association in 1997 and the National Association of Broadcasters in 1992, and Parliamentary testimony on behalf of the Combined Newspaper and Magazine Copyright Committee of Australia in Sydney in 1993.

Professor Nimmer received an A.B. with distinction and honors in 1977 from Stanford University and his J.D. in 1980 from Yale Law School, where he served as editor of the *Yale Law Journal*.
